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Local Plan 2018

Thank you everyone who came to our Public Exhibition on 05 November 2018 and who attended the meeting of the council's Planning and Transportation Committee that same day. We have submitted a representation based upon our own and the diverse views expressed we received during our consultation. We find many areas of commonality which we welcome, and on balance we agree with the key objectives of the plan. It is Tonbridge and Malling Borough Councils urgent duty to properly plan for new homes for the future. You will find a full transcript of our representation on our website but, in brief, whilst we have no objection in principle to the inclusion of Church Lane as a potential site for housing, this should not be at the expense of other factors such as:

- a. Any adverse effect on the existing community. There must be benefits to East Peckham and the existing community. The development must be what the community needs
- b. Flood Preventative Measures to deal with increased rainwater runoff.
- c. Improvements to existing infrastructure
- d. Any negative impact the proposed development might have on wildlife and green spaces

As we are so close to the May 2019 Parish Council Election we are unable to fill the vacancy, so it will remain vacant until the election. We will shortly be putting together an information pack which will be available on our website.


Every year we set a balanced budget which reflects the services you want whilst at the same time fulfils our statutory obligations. You can find our draft budgetary proposals on our website; we invite feedback on these proposals which indicate an increase in the Parish Precept from £140,000 to £142,000.

A huge thank you for supporting our Christmas Lights, so far fundraising has raised over £5,400 including a brilliant £3,925 from the Co-op Community Fund. This year's lights are bigger, brighter and better than before but they do not come cheap, our expenditure on Christmas Lighting is expected to be in excess of £9,000.

We continue to strive to make our parish a desirable place to live, we all need to play our part so do please help our community groups and continue to do your bit where you can for where you live.

Community Grants

EAST PECKHAM LOYALTY SCHEME

Our Loyalty Scheme is growing in popularity. Participating retailers include Khan Spice, the Post Office, Village Butchers and Store, Pam's Pantry, Headlocks Hair Design, Heavenly Glaze, Irelands Bakery, Pound Fish Bar, Field Pharmacy and County Fires. Emergency Planning

Flood Wardens: More flood wardens are needed in the village - if you are interested and would like to find out more, we would be delighted to hear from you.

Sandbag Containers: The containers located in the Pound Road and Pippin Road (Jubilee Hall) car parks will be opened by any Parish Council Representative or Flood Warden if we believe that residential areas are threatened with flooding. It is worth remembering that sandbags are not for the protection of outbuildings or garages and the first line of defence in any emergency is to be self-sufficient.

Community Emergency Plan: The latest version can be found on our website.

Flood Warnings: To receive flood warnings from the Environment Agency, register with Floodline Warnings Direct on the website www.environment-agency.gov.uk or telephone 0845 988 1188.

Drain Cleansing: Kent Highway Services has advised that gully cleansing is carried out on Strategic and Locally Important routes every 12 months and that each road's classification is determined by the maintenance hierarchy in the National Street Gazetteer. All other roads and drainage assets, including soakaways, highway ditches, highway ponds, culverts and grips, are maintained on a targeted basis which means that cleansing is arranged in response to enquiries and reports of flooding. Cleansing is prioritised at sites where there is a risk to road safety or homes.

East Peckham Flood Action Group: The East Peckham Flood Action Group was set up to identify and prioritise the many flooding problems across the Parish area and liaise with and encourage the various Flood Risk Management Authorities to undertake the work that is necessary to resolve these flooding problems. To achieve this the Group will be supported by the [National Flood Forum](#) which is a charity organisation to help, support and represent people at risk of flooding. If you are interested and would like to find out more, please let us know.

Community Defibrillator

The defibrillator is stored in a secure box attached to the wall of the Jubilee Hall. It is an intelligent item of medical equipment which 'talks' to the operator and gives easy instructions. SECamb know its location so when someone dials 999 about a possible heart attack, they can immediately see if there is a defibrillator near the caller, give them the access code and direct them there. Thanks to funding support from our County Councillor Matthew Balfour we plan to install another defibrillator, hopefully we will be able to find a suitable location in the village centre.

Funding cuts have cut back on regular patrols to identify problems and KCC relies on us all to report them.

Dealing with litter

You may have noticed how much litter there is on our roads. Our village highways are often strewn with litter and there have been occasions when bags and larger items have been, it would seem, thrown from a moving vehicle. We've also seen flytipping, with fridges and freezers decorating our beautiful countryside. If you notice great amounts of litter or flytipping that needs urgent attention report it to Tonbridge and Malling Borough Council who have dedicated response teams **01732 844522**.

Dog Fouling

It's a shame that a few uncaring dog owners spoil things. Dog deposits provided it's bagged up can be put into any amenity bin – not household bins. If you see anyone failing to clear up after their dog contact the Community or Dog Wardens. Please be aware that failing to clear up after your dog is an offence which TMBC enforces through the Dogs Fouling of Land Act 1996 which applies to all open land within the borough to which the public have access. If you've a dog fouling complaint obtain as much information as possible as it will assist the Dog Warden. Parking on Pavements

This is a common problem in our village partly because many roads were built before cars and because drivers wish to park as close as possible to where they live. If you spot a vehicle wrongly parked, call 101 and our PCSO will try and attend. Whilst PCSO's can't issue tickets they can issue advice.

Parking Outside EP Primary School

We continue to receive complaints regarding parking outside the Primary School. The school does what it can, but the problem is a matter for the Traffic Wardens to address and they are unable to stop people parking on the yellow lines.

Some residents have voiced concerns about excessive speeds on our roads. To address the problem and with the help of a grant from our County Councillor, we're considering purchasing a Speed Indicator Device. As we have to ascertain if there is community support we need your help. We need to prove the need for the scheme by identifying suitable locations and a team of volunteers who will be responsible for coordinating the scheme, the periodical relocation of the Speed Indicator Device and battery charging and changing. If you are interested and would like to find out more we would be delighted to hear from you. A decision will be made in January 2019.

Environmental Enhancements Update

Renovation of Fingerposts: Work to renovate the fingerposts at Martins Lane, Bullen Lane and Bush Road had been completed.

Hanging Baskets: The winter/spring arrangements are now installed on the six columns on our land in the village centre and on the streetlight column in the village centre.

Tree Safety Audit: On a bi-annual basis we carry out a tree safety audit on trees on our land, which is the grassed area in the village centre and the playing fields. The audit was carried out on 08 November 2019. Whilst the audit did not identify any work of an urgent nature we have been advised to undertake some work within 3 months of the audit, this work will be carried out shortly. The audit seeks to reduce the risk level to one considered acceptable given the trees location, its use and the perception of its value to the environment.

Trees in the Village Competition 2018: Congratulations East Peckham, our village was 'highly commended' by the judging panel; the reasons for this commendation were as follows:

- The place and role of trees was well respected in the village
- The variety of trees added to the attractiveness of the village
- The very high level of tree maintenance and care that the judge witnessed.

East Peckham Village Centre: We've submitted a complaint to KCC regarding the lack of maintenance to their paved area of land in front of the parade of shops which is in places a trip hazard. It is unfair that the only maintenance work carried out on this land in recent years has been by the Parish Council at the expense of East Peckham Council Tax payers. We firmly believe that KCC should take their landowner responsibilities seriously and maintain this land or transfer the land to us so that we can maintain and develop it for the benefit of the village.

Polling District Review

TMBC are currently undertaking a review of polling districts, places and stations and is keen to obtain views as to how suitable the current arrangements are and for alternative venues to be suggested for consideration. The review has been timed so that everything is in place for the May 2019 Elections. Further information about the review can be obtained from www.tmbc.gov.uk. We have suggested that the Jubilee Hall be considered as a possible Polling Station venue.

TMBC New Waste & Recycling Service

Tonbridge and Malling Borough Council in partnership with Tunbridge Wells Borough Council has awarded an eight-year contract for a new recycling and waste collection and street cleansing service to Urbaser Ltd. The new contract will commence on 01 March 2019 and will provide improved recycling and street cleansing services across both boroughs. Initially services will continue as before but as significant logistical arrangements are required the contract includes a 'bedding in' period of several months. Information on the new service is available on our website and there will be leaflet drops to residential properties. In the run up to the launch of the new service the Borough Council will be attending one of meetings to explain how the new recycling collections would operate, we will publish information when we know when this meeting will take place.

LOCAL WINTER MANAGEMENT POLICY

INTRODUCTION

This plan has been created to clarify what can be expected from EPPC. EPPC has no statutory duties to prepare for and deal with snow and ice (except around our own property). Whilst we do not have the resources to make a commitment to provide a snow clearing service we will endeavour to assist where we can.

WHERE GRITTING WILL BE UNDERTAKEN BY THE PARISH COUNCIL

During periods of severe/persistent frost, ice or snow EPPC will **ENDEAVOUR** to treat the following locations where the public have access;

- Entrances to the Parish Office and the Jubilee Hall, Pippin Road, East Peckham
- Jubilee Hall Car Park, Pippin Road, East Peckham (main walkway from car park)
- Path to the Primary School via the Playing Fields

Our janitor will endeavour to grit/clear snow on arrival on site. Priority will be given to the car park and entrances to the Jubilee Hall and parish office. Where possible gritting will be carried out on a daily priority basis. It should be noted that in extreme weather conditions where transport is difficult or dangerous it may not be possible to treat the locations mentioned above. It is also to be noted that in very low temperatures the effectiveness of salt is significantly reduced.

ROLE OF KENT COUNTY COUNCIL

1. To carry out such precautionary salting and snow clearing, as far as reasonably possible, to keep the precautionary salting network free from ice and snow, permit the safe movement of vehicular traffic and pedestrians and minimise delays and accidents directly attributable to the adverse weather conditions.
2. KCC takes its winter service responsibilities seriously and is proactive as well as reactive to winter weather conditions. Winter service costs KCC in the region of £3.3m every winter and needs careful management to achieve safety for the travelling public and to be efficient. KCC work to ensure that the winter service standards and decisions made are consistent across the whole county and its annual Winter Service policy and plan are used to determine actions that will be taken to manage its winter service operations.

ROLE OF TONBRIDGE AND MALLING BOROUGH COUNCIL

1. TMBC's Local Winter Service Plan complements the KCC Winter Service Policy and Plan 2017/8; the Policy is available on the KCC website.
2. Arrangements have been put in place whereby labour from TMBC can be used during snow days. Additionally, KCC will supply a quantity of a salt to TMBC for use on the highway network. TMPC's Local Winter Service Plan will come into effect when a snow emergency is declared that affects Tonbridge and Malling

Pavement clearance

Areas for clearing pavements have been identified in the Local Winter Service Plan. These are the areas where local knowledge has indicated that people are concerned and would most like to be kept clear when there is snow and ice.

Farmers

Contracted farmers make a difference in keeping rural areas clear on snow days. Farmers have predetermined local routes and will use their own tractor and KCC ploughs for clearing snow. When snow reaches a depth of 50mm on roads in their areas the farmers will commence ploughing notifying KCC as agreed in their contract.

PROPERTY OR LAND WHICH WILL NOT BE GRITTED BY THE PARISH COUNCIL

- Playing Field Allotment site – not a priority area
- Orchard Road Post Office – responsibility of landowner
- The Village Centre - responsibility of landowner/tenant
- Bus shelters – owned by EPPC at various locations in the Parish – access may be difficult in severe weather therefore gritting cannot be guaranteed

Personal Protective Equipment: EPPC will ensure the caretaker has appropriate PPE to do this to include hi-vis, waterproofs and boots.

RISK ASSESSMENT: EPPC has completed a Risk Assessment for snow and ice clearance activities which is reviewed annually.

LEGAL ADVICE: People have been hesitant to clear snow because of fears of litigation if someone should slip on the treated area. The prospect of a person who volunteers to clear snow from a pavement being successfully sued for damages by a person who subsequently slips on the cleared area and is injured is very small.

The snow code – tips on clearing snow and ice from pavements or public spaces Don't be put off clearing paths because you're afraid someone will get injured. Remember, people walking on snow and ice have a responsibility to be careful themselves.

Clear the snow and ice early in the day

It's easier to move fresh, loose snow rather than hard snow that's packed together. If you remove the top layer of snow in the morning, any sunshine during the day will help melt any ice beneath. You can then cover the path with salt before nightfall to stop it refreezing.

Preventing slips: Pay attention to clearing snow and ice from steps and steep pathways

Use salt or sand - not water: Don't make pathways more dangerous by causing them to refreeze. If you use water to melt snow, it may refreeze and turn to black ice which increases the risk of injuries as it's invisible and slippery. You can melt snow or prevent black ice by spreading salt on the area you have cleared. Don't use the salt found in salting bins – this will be needed to keep the roads clear. If you don't have enough salt, you can also use sand or ash. These won't stop the path icing over as effectively as salt but will provide good grip underfoot.

Take care where you move the snow: When shovelling snow, take care where you put it, so it doesn't block people's paths or drains. Make sure you make a path down the middle of the area to be cleared, so you have a clear surface to walk on. Then shovel the snow from the centre of the path to the sides.

Offer to clear your neighbours' paths: If your neighbour has difficulty getting in and out of their home, offer to clear snow and ice around their property. Check that any elderly or disabled neighbours are alright in the cold weather. If you're worried about them, try contacting their relatives or friends, or the community warden.
